and now for the article i promised you last week...

a quick intro to git cherry-pick

cherry-pick is an easy way to quickly grab a commit from a branch and apply it to their desired target branch. it's often seen when you patch something in, say for example, release-1 and also need it applied in your main branch.

let's try it!

git log # find the commit hash you want...

git checkout main # switch to the desired branch (ie: main)

git cherry-pick <release-1 commit hash> # ...and run it!

easy as cherry pie, amirite?;)

if you want to pick a range of commits, you can just do:

git cherry-pick abc123...xyz789

for single commits, it's:

git cherry-pick abc123 def456 xyz789

it behaves similar to git rebase, so you can think of it that way. the difference is that cherry-pick applies it on top of all the existing commits, and rebase rewrites a series of its own commits on top of the tip.

cherry-pick is generally reserved for special occasions. it's best practice to not use cherry-pick super often, not because it's a bad idea to use it, but because what you can do with it may or may not be best practice. hotfixes using cherry-pick are super common but (obviously) you're responsible for anything your code does, so be careful when you use it:)
